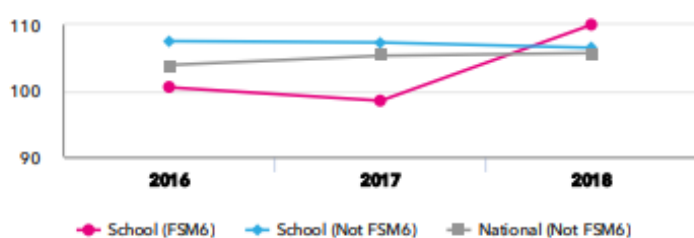
Impact

Disadvantaged pupils

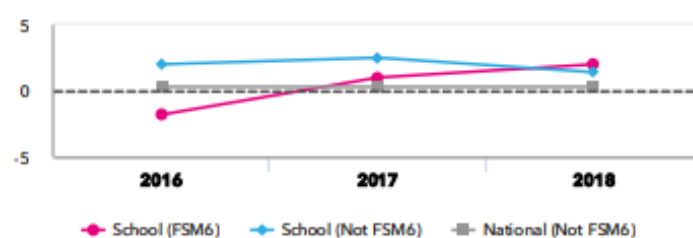
KS2 attainment for disadvantaged pupils 2018

This was an improving trend but it must be noted the number in this cohort was small and the data is on track to fluctuate from year to year. It is our challenge to stabilise the trend.

In Key Stage 1, there group of eligible pupils was so small that the statistical significance of the group was affected.

There was a 75% pass rate for children eligible for funding who took the Phonics Screening Test at the end of Year 1.

Across Key Stage 2, there were 12 eligible children (five of whom were also on the school's Additional Needs List). In Reading 8 of the children (66.6%) had reached nationally expected standard by the end of the year, with 4 children still working towards that standard. In Writing, 1 child was judged to have reached a 'Good' standard (i.e. above national expected), with 4 children reaching national standard, and the remaining 7 working towards the standard.

Attendance for some children eligible for funding had previously had an impact on attainment and had been closely worked on by the school. This meant that with support, attendance improved over the year.

Barriers:

The school recognises that parental involvement can have a direct impact on a child's progress, as can other family factors outside the control of the school. Staff have endeavoured to work with parents and children to ensure they are supported as far as possible and have ensured that parents have been kept fully informed of the progress of the children.

Review

The Governors reviewed the achievements of children eligible for Pupil Premium Funding in October 2018, and they will continue to do this through the Governors Standards Committee, as well as at Full Governing Body Meetings throughout the current academic year. The next time this should be reviewed is in January 2019.

The Governor responsible for overseeing provision for children eligible for Pupil Premium Funding is Mr. Mike Andersen.
